## New Communications

1. R. Briggs attended a NHMA webinar on prescriptive roads. It was noted that if the general public uses a private road or Class VI road for 20 years prior to 1968, the town has to make the road a town road.

## Public Hearing called to order: 6:15pm

- 1. Amendment to Appendix D of the Subdivision Regulations. R Briggs said the Chatham fees are less than most towns. Mailing fees are correct on the subdivision regulations. It was suggested to increase the filing fee to \$75 plus \$25 per lot, which includes the fee for plans to be mailed back to us from the registry. The public notice fee will remain at \$35. LChip fee is \$25 made out to Carroll Country Registry of Deeds. Recording fees shall be charged to the applicant at the current rate as per the Carroll County Registry of Deeds Fee Schedule.
- 2. Revised Master Plan will be put on the town website. The Selectmen have approved the revised Master Plan. Discussion was tabled until the 2<sup>nd</sup> public hearing on June 17<sup>th</sup>.

## Other Business

1. Tom Gross, President of Saco Headwaters Alliance (SHA), gave a presentation on what SHA does and how the town can benefit. The idea is to have a variety of organizations get together to protect the waterways in our area. The alliance identifies local/municipal clean water priorities and matches them with priority funding opportunities from private foundations, and state and federal clean water programs. They also assist in grant-writing to obtain the funds. They are inviting municipalities to get a self-assessment for potential planning, help with ordinances and resource

data. It was noted that Chatham has limited resource protection and zoning. Residents rely on groundwater for private water supplies. R Briggs noted that Chatham is unique in that 85% of town is Nation Forest, there is no town water or sewer and we don't have 3 phase power. R Briggs said we would be interested in what data they have to share and what our potential threats are in Chatham.
